Disability Rights Movement (a brief history)

- Early 20th Century discriminatory laws
- 1930s/1940s National Federation of the Blind and American Federation of the Physically Handicapped fought to end job discrimination
- 1960s Ed Roberts and the birth of the independent living movement in Berkeley
- 1970s Rehabilitation Act, continued protests for accessible public transit and more employment opportunities
- 1980s continued protests regarding public accessibility and better access to healthcare
- 1990 Protests on Capitol Hill, ADA signed into law
- 2000s to today continued protests for equity, healthcare, inclusion, and representation

What is image description?

"Image descriptions help visitors who are blind or have low-vision access the information contained in images. Description also makes it easier to find images through the image's content as opposed to the caption or title of the object that it depicts."

Alt text vs. long description

Alt Text:

Shortened from "alternative text," this is a short visual description that provides a general sense of the content of an image. It is often structured as a sentence fragment that indicates the most important content of the image. Usually it is no longer than 15 words.

Long Description:

A long description sets out to provide more extensive and detailed visual information. It can be thought of as the analog version of the sighted users' lightbox view of an image as it provides a closer look at the image. Long descriptions can be anywhere from a couple of sentences to multiple paragraphs, written in complete sentences. The complexity of the image will contribute to the length of the description. Long descriptions should comprehensively describe the most important content of the image augmented by details.


Alt text

A large boulder with a painted smirking face crushes the roof of a black sedan

Long description

This sculpture is a large boulder smashed on top of the roof of a car. The boulder is 9 tons and is roughly the size of a baby elephant. The boulder has a deep reddish brown hue and a rough, jagged texture. Durham painted a face on the boulder, placing it so that pointed end becomes the face's nose. It is a cartoon-like face. The mouth is a straight line and resembles a smug smirk. The car is a black Dodge Spirit, a sedan about 15 feet long. It is similar to a Honda Accord. The car's roof is entirely caved in. The entire car bows in towards the center from the weight of the boulder.
